

GREETINGS FROM THE EDGE would be an appropriate postcard from Arizona's National Parks, with the most popular being the Grand Canyon. Cut by the Colorado River the enormous magnitude of this 6,001'D (1mile) canyon exposes ancient layers of rock strata, painting breathtaking vistas while securing its place as one of the Natural Wonders of the World. Traveling east along

the Southern Colorado Plateau, leads into the Navajo valley, featuring towering sandstone formations up to 1,000'H. Wind and water have eroded the rock plateaus into miles of mesas and buttes, sculpting the landscape which defines the quintessential vision of "the west". 82% of the land in AZ is in public trust to the state, with 27% designated as tribal reservations to the 21 recognized Native American tribes, with the Navajos being the largest. Turning south





towards Tucson, passing through the Petrified Forest National Park, our virtual roadtrip takes us to the Saguaro National Park. This small area is the only place the giant Saguaro cacti is found. Living up to 250 years it can grow up to 30'H and weigh up to 8 ton. The Carnegiea Gigantea was named after Andrew Carnegie, who established a desert lab for native plant research. Mission San Xavier del Bac is a premier example of Spanish Colonial architecture. Traditional, breathable mud plaster made with pulp from the prickly pear cactus, is replacing cementbased stucco in an extensive restoration of the ornate New Spain-Native American interior.



Gold LEED certification and multiple award winner, ASU's College Avenue Commons is the campus's new gateway, and home to the School of Sustainable Engineering and the Built Environment. It is a refined example of ASU's commitment to sustainable design.



The James C. Wyant College of Optical Sciences uses a series of faceted glass apertures and light shafts to control and direct light deep in to the interior. This award winning design is fitting for the premier optic research institution it houses on University of Arizona's campus.




